• Medal design Emile reports the po box has not been checked for designs. We may have to have designs scanned and sent to Emile.


• Old Business- The program schedule was discussed.

A Story of Juan Bautista de Anza by: Allison Paker from newspaper articles provided by Michael S. Turrini

99 days before the signing of the Declaration of Independence, Lieutenant Juan Bautista de Anza claimed San Francisco by staking the flag of Spain on the shores of the bay on March 27, 1776. He had been serving as the Commandante of Tubac Presidio in Sonora but desired to discover an overland route to Alta California. He championed for an opportunity to lead an expedition and even went so far as to say he would fund it himself. Eventually, he was given the chance and led two expeditions north.

The first left in January 1774 and served mostly as an exploratory journey. The second left on October 23, 1775 with the purpose to colonize the San Francisco Bay Area. His entourage included soldiers who once they had served a year would receive a land grant, women, children, cowboys, servants, mule drivers and their mules, cows, and horses.

It took the large group 73

days to reach Monterey and along the way, the population increased by one when Salvador Ignacio Linares was born on Christmas Eve. After resting in Monterey, de Anza led the group north to San Francisco which at the time was teeming with wildlife and wild flowers. He planted the flag and named the area where the Presidio now stands as Punta del Cantil Blanco (Point of the Steep White Cliff). De Anza had successfully shown that there was an overland route to reach California from Sonora and founded what would become one of the most iconic cities in the world.

De Anza returned home and served as governor of New Mexico which at that time included California, Arizona, the current New Mexico, much of Texas, and northern Mexico. He was ungracefully dismissed though when Yuma Indians attacked the overland route near the Colorado River. De Anza died at age 53 in 1783 and was buried at Cathedral de Nuestra Sonora de la Asuncion in Arizpe, Sonora, Mexico with full honors.

Because of renovations over the 187 years he was buried in the cathedral, the location of his grave was lost. In February of 1963, workmen laying tile discovered three caskets. Padre Magallanes hypothesized that one may be de Anza. A team from the University of California was dispatched and able to identify the remains as de Anza.

The mayor of San Francisco, Mayor Christopher, appointed a committee to build a memorial for de Anza. Marble was used to build a new sarcophagus in the cathedral, and in June of 1963, a Mass for the Dead was held along with speeches from officials of the Mexican government and representatives of the city of San Francisco to lay Juan Bautista de Anza to rest.
