Joe Mobilia was born on May 5, 1954 in Brighton MA to the late Henry and Mary Mobilia. He grew up in Somerville, MA, playing basketball, running track, and fishing at Pillsbury Lake, NH. Joe graduated Matignon High School in 1972 and went on to earn a Bachelor's degree in Physics from University of Massachusetts, Boston and a Master's degree in Physics from Boston College. There were also a bunch of kids attending again this year, and we had a virtual scavenger hunt for them to look for specific coins in some of the dealer's cases. Thanks to Michael T. and Don H. for setting up the youth table and providing lots of giveaways for every youth attendee. Also, every youth who completed the scavenger hunt received an ANACS sample slab.

We added additional hourly prize drawings of a silver eagle, as well as the big drawing at the end of the show with 10 silver eagles, 2 dos pesos gold coins, and a \$2½ gold coin. In addition, we had donations from Great Collections as part of the hourly drawings. All of these extra prizes helped increase the number of drawing tickets sold this year.

It was great to have another successful show. We finished with increased proceeds compared to last year, and a profit which will support club operations and events through the year. Now, it's time to start planning for next year's show!

Auctions

Club members are welcome to sell some numismatic items at each meeting if they wish. Sellers or consigners should help the auction process by doing their homework by researching the items' details beyond just the date, mint mark, grade, and prices of the coins, books, or storage containers they wish to sell. They should consider presenting the item appropriately, in protective flips or OGP (original government packaging), and include the details on or included with the auction slip on a separate piece of paper, to help the auctioneer "sell" your items. Writing needs to be neat and legible, preferably printed or typed, to avoid auctioneer errors when offering each item. Be clear on the "opening", "reserve", or "minimum bid" and include the item's estimated current value. Doors to the club General Meetings open 30 minutes prior to the meeting start time. Please plan to arrive 30 minutes early to help set up the room's chairs and tables, and to give yourself enough time to fill out an auction slip and review the other auction items so you know what you might want to bid on. Please do not arrive earlier than 30 minutes. before meeting time. Bring a Red Book so you will be more prepared with knowledge of your own. If you don't have the 2026 Red Book, see Ken in the back of the room. The room is not set up for us by the church. We need help from members to start and end the meeting on time. Please stay until the end to help clean up and put the tables and chairs away. The small handful of members left do not get to leave until after 10:00 pm because we are left cleaning up and putting everything away. Thank you.

Quiz: U.S. Circulating Coins

- 1. Victor David Brenner's initials were famously removed from the Lincoln cent in 1909, during its first year of issue. Were his VDB initials ever restored, and if so, in what year?
- 2. After more than a century of designs featuring an allegorical Liberty on the obverse, the Lincoln cent was the first circulating coin to feature a real-life individual. Since that time, which individuals were featured on the obverse of circulating coins who were **not** former presidents?
- **3.** Prior to the Lincoln cent, what circulating coins did not feature an allegorical Liberty on their obverses?
- 4. On high-grade Lincoln Memorial cents, one can see Lincoln's statue on the reverse within the memorial; thus, this is a coin with the same individual depicted on both the obverse and reverse. What other circulating coins show the same person on both sides of a coin?
- **5.** Among today's circulating coins, the dime, quarter, and half dollar have reeded edges; the others do not. Why?
- **6.** The first cents were minted in 1793 and have been minted every year since then except for 1815. Why were none minted in that year?
- 7. Prior to the opening of branch mints in 1838 in Charlotte, NC, Dahlonega, GA, and New Orleans, LA, U.S. coins did not have mint marks. In what other period of time were mint marks absent from coins?
